THY KINGDOM COME PRAYER MOVEMENT

During the time from Ascension to Pentecost, the Land's End benefice is playing a key role in the Land's End to John O'Groats prayer route.

As well as being part of the Lord's Prayer, Thy Kingdom Come is the name given to a plea from the Archbishop of Canterbury to encourage as many people as possible, during the time between Ascension and Pentecost, to pledge to pray with him so that other people will know the love of Jesus.

He says, "Through the hardest and most painful times and in the best and most joyful times in my life, Jesus has worked alongside me, He's never left, even when I've wanted Him to. When I've felt ready to give up hope, He picked me up and it's His love that has healed me and strengthened me. Following Jesus has been the core point of my life, and that's one reason I want everyone to hear His voice calling to them and to learn what it is to find His love, His call, His direction, His purpose."

Revd Canon Vanda Perrett, of the Land's End Benefice, confessed at a recent Lent talk that during the ordination process she was described as being not what the church wanted, but what they needed! Like the Archbishop of Canterbury, she heard Jesus voice calling and, knowing herself to be His child, she has thrown herself into seeking His direction and purpose within the community at the far west of our county.

A thread that runs through that community is the Land's End to John O'Groats trail, pilgrimage or, for some, endurance test. Call it what you will, Revd

Vanda sees it as an opportunity to grow the Kingdom.

During the time from Ascension to Pentecost, which is May 25th to June 3rd, the Land's End benefice is designating the time to pray for everyone travelling on this route. Co-ordinating the Land's End benefice part of the adventure, Revd Vanda is hoping other churches will take up the praying baton further up country, with the hope that the whole route will be covered in prayer. Revd Vanda would also like to hear from other Cornish churches along the route who would like to get involved.

"We're starting at the most western point at Land's End, on Ascension Day, at 8am for a short time of prayer with Archdeacon Bill Stuart-White followed by a breakfast at the Land's End Hotel for anyone that wants to join in," says Revd Vanda. Then there will be a 10am Eucharist in St Levan Church in the "Walkers Chapel" followed by lunchtime prayers at 1pm in St Buryan Church, followed by a soup lunch. The day will end at the third church in the Benefice, Sennen Church, where there will be a simple Celtic evening time of prayer.

Happy Easter! Christ has risen, let us celebrate and become better stewards of creation - not just the caretakers.

It was Bishop Chris who said, "not just caretakers" as I was lucky enough to walk alongside him on his pilgrimage. As he invited those that did to practice 'mindful walking' I was overcome by thinking about how the climate was for those early Saints travelling that path. There we were gazing at the Holy Well founded by St. Cadoc and the realisation of the time he stood there with a significant knowledge of a different climate.

This enables us to realise climate will continue to change, but we can live in closer harmony with God's intentions and contribute to the earth's fruitfulness and sustainability. ARCHDEACON BILL'S LETTER

ARCHDEACON BILL

Like many people, I suspect, patience is a gift I admire in others but struggle to practice myself. Many is the time I've uttered the familiar prayer "Lord give me patience and give it to me NOW!" Which means that "watching and waiting" don't come easily. But that is precisely what I was doing last night. As I write, I am privileged to be sharing in Holy Week worship with the parishes of the Mount's Bay benefice and this has included a first for me, a "Watch" after our Maundy Thursday Eucharist into the start of Good Friday.

We gathered on benches and chairs around a brazier in the Sacred Space in Perranuthnoe churchyard and we watched and waited, putting ourselves in mind of Jesus and the disciples in the garden of Gethsemane. "Watch and pray" was his command and, swaddled in layers of clothing, that's what we did.

The prospect of 3½ hours in near silence on a chilly April night and in darkness relieved only by the flickering flames was a slightly daunting one. Whatever would I find to think about for all that time? Would I manage to pray for more than my customary couple of minutes at a time? Would I fall asleep like Peter and co?

The "Watch" turned out to be a real blessing... not always easy, but then it wasn't meant to be. Among many other things, as I reflected on the disciples and their experience of that confusing and frightening night, it gave me the chance to consider what is in store for the Diocese of Truro now that we know that Bishop Tim is moving on.

The prospect of change and loss can bring uncertainty and fear and sometimes all we can do is simply watch and pray. There will be plenty of opportunity for that over the coming months, while others work hard in the background to find the next Bishop of Truro. Sometimes, even for the activists among us, it is the most valuable thing we can do.

To watch and pray is a simple affirmation that God is in control, and that no amount of our activity, or anxiety, can match the power of trusting prayer. Maundy Thursday confusion in the garden led to Easter Sunday joy as God made good his promises and brought hope out of despair and gladness out of sorrow. He has done the same for His people countless times in countless ways ever since and He'll prove faithful to us too.

So watch and wait and pray. Pray for Bishop Tim as he prepares to move, for Bishop Chris as he prepares for new responsibilities and for all who'll make decisions on our behalf. Patience won't be easy, but it will be rewarded.

MISSION CASE STUDY

MONEY ADVICE FROM CHURCH VOLUNTEERS AT LAUNCESTON MONEY ADVICE CENTRE

For Launceston Money Advice Centre, it all started with small and humble beginnings as an initiative from Launceston Churches Together in 2013.

Fast forward 3 years and they have moved their team of volunteers to their new offices at The Gateway Centre Launceston. The new office gives a professional look and offers disabled access with a lift. From here they cover the whole of North East Cornwall Bude to Altermum to Saltash and from Bodmin to Wadebridge.

Launceston Money Advice Centre (LMAC) currently sees round 6-7 new clients each month who are referred to them in a variety of ways: self-referral through their website; referrals through the foodbank; referrals between friends and those who are signposted by the leaflets which are distributed in local libraries, churches, job centres and the one-stop shop.

The centre is managed by Sarah Vinson and it is Sarah and her team of volunteers that help people with serious money and debt issues. There are currently five volunteers including one who specialises in benefits. Each volunteer needs to undergo thorough training before they are able to meet and advise a client. The volunteers all take part in online financial awareness courses, complete courses in personal data protection and safeguarding, and all have to be DBS checked. In total they are required to complete 12 – 20 hours of training before they become a volunteer advisor. LMAC is affiliated to the national charity Community Money Advice and are regulated by the Financial Conduct Authority.

One advisor at the centre, Nigel Parker explains:



“Although we are volunteers, we have to undertake a lot of training which results in the Launceston Money Advice Centre being a professional organisation that offers expert advice to people who really need it.”

The majority of people are typically struggling with managing their money which often coincides with a life changing event such as redundancy or have a medical condition that affects their ability to work or fulfil their caring role. Other triggers to money problems may be the breakdown of a relationship, debts in social housing, and issues with late or overpayment of state and local benefits. The average debt the volunteers work with is £5000 - £6000 with some clients owning significantly more than this. The volunteer advisor starts by going through the client's money or debt worries and creates an initial online assessment of their income, expenses and creditors. Once they have done this, the client has the option to sign a contract of authorisation for Launceston Money Advice Centre to act on their behalf.

HERITAGE LOTTERY FUND GRANTS FOR PLACES OF WORSHIP TO CLOSE

From September 2017, the Heritage Lottery Fund's (HLF) Grants for Places of Worship programme will close to new applications. This does not affect the government's grant scheme for reimbursing expenditure on VAT (called the Listed Places of Worship Grant Scheme). In its place, funding for repairs of places of worship will be available through HLF's existing Our Heritage (up to £100,000) and Heritage Grants (up to £5 million) programmes. These grants will be available to both listed and unlisted places of worship.
