TRANSFORMING MISSION: FALMOUTH TO LEAD THE WAY

Nearly £2 million is to be invested over five years to change the face of the Church in Cornwall, starting in the Falmouth area.

The Diocese of Truro and the Strategic Investment Board of the Archbishops' Council will between them fund the £1.9 million plan that will see the way church is 'done' transformed in the diocese, starting in Falmouth, with particular emphasis on reaching the 'missing generations' of families and young people.

The church will actively reach out with a new student ministry based in the café at King Charles the Martyr Church, which will be fitted out for the purpose. All Saints Parish Church will become a 'resource church', with a new Pioneer Priest and team, including a Student Minister and a Children and Families' Worker, leading the current congregation and developing new work at All Saints and across the Falmouth area.

The diocese applied for help with funding for the project from the Strategic Investment Board, which came up trumps and has offered a £1.2 million grant.

The church has set itself clear targets in terms of the numbers of worshippers it hopes to attract to its new and existing services. The Pioneer Priest will investigate new ways of reaching out to people and

explore ways in which worship can be built into the lives of young people, instead of expecting them to engage with traditional church services.

It is also hoped that by making church more relevant to young people's lives the church will be able to identify and nurture future candidates for ordination and other leadership roles.

The aim is to invest in and work on the project in Falmouth, and then use its key successes and learnings to provide a template to be rolled out in other Cornish towns in the future.

FINAL SERVICE FOR BISHOP TIM

Truro Cathedral was filled with joy, hope, laughter, and sadness, when people gathered to worship with Bishop Tim as he presided over his final Eucharist service as diocesan bishop.

He was joined by Bishop Chris, Dean Roger, Archdeacons Audrey and Bill, and, characteristically, Revd Steve Wild, chairman of Cornwall's Methodist District, as well as pupils from some of Cornwall's church schools, and members of Cornwall Deaf Church.

The Sung Eucharist also featured the Truro Cathedral Choir, and other musicians, as



well as readings from Bishop Tim's wife, Sián, and Diocesan Secretary Esther Pollard.

During a memorable and beautiful service, Bishop Tim gave a sermon that spoke of his life as a diocesan bishop in Cornwall.

He said: "Tragically, as we also know, there is a gap between perception and reality of life in Cornwall. Many are suffering and may be struggling to survive. Thousands of volunteers work day by day because of their Christian faith to help those who are struggling.

"I urge you to notice the gap there is in your lives between reality and perception and work on closing it.

"Brothers and sisters in Christ, mind the gap, keep working on what God calls us to be and enjoy the daily challenge of being a disciple of Jesus Christ who is alive.

"Thank you, keep the faith, and goodbye."

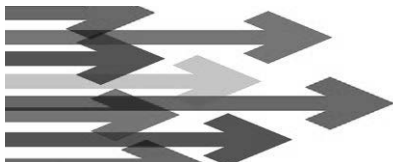

TRANSFORMING MISSION

The Revd Chris Thomson has recently moved to the South West; he has been helping prepare the ground for Transforming Mission. He writes:

“ God calls. The very meaning of life is found in relationship with our God who alone is the answer to the joys, vulnerabilities and mysteries of the human condition.

Because we are made by Him, and for relationship with Him, we are restless until we find our centre in Him. He is constantly calling us into the fullness of who we are meant to be. In Jesus, we are met by God face to face, and shown what it is to be fully human. In Jesus, we have God himself showing us that he knows us intimately, knows the deepest depths of our souls, and through Jesus' life, death and resurrection we can know God personally also. Are you hearing his call to you?

Jesus has commissioned His Church with the task of sharing this good news with the world: to heal lives, repair souls, end loneliness, lift burdens, give people certain hope, set trapped people free, reveal purpose and meaning to every person, and show the truth of that unending joy which weathers

all the storms of life because it is found in Jesus: the one who, unlike so much in our life, is never corroded and is always with us.

Transforming Mission is nothing less than a response to this commission. We believe that God is calling us, by the power of His Holy Spirit, to establish five new Resource Churches across Cornwall. These churches will aim constantly to communicate and engage in accessible ways, to raise up vocations, to work to heal society, to reach the 'un-Churched' and the 'missing generations', to resource other churches, and to plant further churches to continue this vital work in our times.

All are invited to join this adventure, as, together, we continue Jesus' ministry:

“The Spirit of the Lord is upon me, because he has anointed me to bring good news to the poor. He has sent me to proclaim release to the captives and recovery of sight to the blind, to let the oppressed go free, to proclaim the year of the Lord's favour.”

PERSONAL REFLECTIONS ON CHURCH GROWTH

REVD DR DAVID ISIORHO

I have just returned from AMD and I was very impressed that it was possible to participate in a discussion of church growth that did not centre on bums on seats or the idea that the only people we wanted in church were under the age of 25. Yes, I am new to the Diocese of Truro and I feel like someone who has come in from the cold. Clearly numerical or quantitative growth is related to qualitative growth. If what we are doing is about God's love and is seen as an example of good practice then other people will want to join in with us. Surely that is what mission and outreach is all about.

I did some research work a few years ago in which I asked people about mission but was very careful not to offer any definition. The findings were interesting and centred around issues of stewardship. Some people wanted more numbers in church to help them pay the parish bills. Others

saw growth in people willing to commit themselves to the parish church and share the responsibility of active lay leadership by working in partnership with their clergy.

My focus as a practical theologian was to engage with the assumptions of research participants and the multi-dimensional nature of mission as understood by active church members. And this particular mode of mission has things to say about Christian witness and reaching out to those beyond the fold with the clear intention of inviting them in.

For me mission is part of what defines church. The only church growth that makes any sense is that which is driven by what the church understands by its mission in the world and to the world.

So, every mission initiative we undertake in the name of Christ should be sustained by prayer. And all this in his glad service.
