CHURCH COMMISSIONERS BACK PLAN TO TRANSFORM MISSION

The architects of a visionary £2.8 million plan to transform the Church of England within the Diocese of Truro are celebrating, following the news that the Church Commissioners have given their backing to the scheme.

The commissioners have backed the plan and agreed a grant of £1.7 million over six years, to add to the £1.15 million pledged by the Diocese of Truro. The diocesan money will be resourced by specific reserves and will not affect the MMF Call, or the money that comes direct from parishes.

The news effectively gives the green light to the scheme, which is the second phase of the diocese's Transforming Mission initiative.

It will see hubs established in St Austell, Camborne, Liskeard and Truro and will ultimately benefit the whole diocese as learnings and experiences are shared across all areas.

Phase one of the scheme saw the Transforming Mission project established in Falmouth, which has already led to the opening of the Huddle café and the creation of New Street Church, which has a sizeable weekly congregation and is growing. The number of people worshipping at the existing All Saints Church has also already grown from an average weekly attendance of 35 to 60.

The funding will be staggered over six years, with a view to the projects becoming self-sustaining after this time.

BISHOP CHRIS TO LEAVE FOR NATIONAL ROLE

Bishop Chris is to leave the Diocese of Truro to head the Church of England's Ministry Division, it has been announced.

In a letter to diocesan clergy and lay colleagues, Bishop Chris said it was an announcement he never expected to make.

Bishop Chris will play a lead role in supporting the continuing renewal of ministry throughout the Church of England as the church looks to increase the scale and diversity of those called to both lay and ordained ministries.

Bishop Chris succeeds Dr Mandy Ford, interim Director of Ministry, who has been leading the division on secondment from the Diocese of Southwark since September 2018.

The Rt Revd Martin Seeley, Bishop of St Edmundsbury and Ipswich and the chair of the Church of England's Ministry Council, said: "Bishop Chris will bring the gifts, expertise and passion we need to engage faithfully and creatively with what God is calling the Church to be. I very much look forward to us working together."

RETIREMENT BECKONS FOR THE BISHOP'S CHAPLAIN

With her neat, dark hair, black clerical shirt and a penchant for a colourful jacket, the Revd Canon Lesley Walker cuts a distinctive figure.

Many people will know her from her 10 years as Rector of Meneage or ensuing stint as the Rural Dean of Kerrier; many more will have come into contact with her as the Bishop's Chaplain.

Those who have taken time to get to know Lesley will be aware of her love of an annual holiday in the sunshine of Barbados, working her way through a huge pile of novels ... not to mention the occasional rum punch.

Motor sports marshal

And a few of her colleagues and friends here in the Diocese of Truro may even know that she has an unusual hobby – as a registered marshal for the Motor Sports Association.

But later this month Lesley will pick up the Lis Escop telephone for the last time, as she steps into a new chapter of her life: retirement.

Her approach to this next stage in life is characteristically relaxed: she hasn't set herself goals in advance, and doesn't have a clear idea of what it will hold for her. But this is not a source of stress, as she is happy to see what God has in store for her.

Because Lesley's life has not been punctuated by what others might consider the usual milestones.

One of the defining moments of her life came when she was just 28. Her husband, Peter, suffered from a



life-limiting heart condition he had had since birth. "In 1982, just after Christmas, he was poorly. He had picked up a bug and had been in a bad way all week, and on the Friday night I said he needed to go and see the doctor. The doctor saw him and sent him straight to the Royal Sussex County Hospital, and he died that night from an embolism."

Lesley was 28, their son David, nine, and their daughter, Amy, just a week off her fourth birthday.

Church community

In the years since their wedding, Lesley and Peter had become increasingly involved in their local church community, and it was to provide Lesley with a great deal of support and help when she found herself suddenly alone. "When we were planning Peter's funeral, we chose God Moves in a Mysterious Way, and that has been very much what life has been about," said Lesley.

IICSA HEARING: JULY 1

The Independent Inquiry into Child Sexual Abuse (IICSA) will start its general hearing on the Anglican Church on July 1.

IICSA was set up in 2015 because of serious concerns that some organisations had failed and in some cases were continuing to fail to protect children.

The Anglican Church in England and Wales is one of the 14 areas being investigated and the inquiry's main focus will be the Church of England. IICSA will assess the appropriateness of the church's safeguarding and child protection policies and practice. There have already been two public hearings with Chichester Diocese and Bishop Peter Ball as case studies.

NEW DIRECTOR FOR SCHOOLS

Katie Fitzsimmons has joined the education team at Church House in the role of Director for Schools. Katie comes with a wealth of experience.

Katie came to teaching from a job in industry, working in London for the Royal Mail in project management. "I had one of those moments of reflection! I was spending my life travelling and dealing with angry people and where was the value in it?"



The other deciding factor was the opportunity to work with children across Cornwall. I remember being at a session for school leaders from the South West once and someone said 'if your child wants to be a doctor, don't send them to school in Cornwall'.

Having decided to train as a teacher, Katie joined the graduate teacher programme which saw her thrown in at the deep end in the classroom. "It really was an incredible space to be in. I was teaching languages in a secondary modern where the head teacher was passionately committed to comprehensive education, to better opportunities for every child."

Katie stepped into school leadership and later moved down to Cornwall with her husband where she continued in secondary education.

Following time spent as a school improvement advisor in Worcestershire, which helped Katie grow her experience across primary and secondary education, she returned to Cornwall and the Diocese of Truro.

"As a Christian, this was a chance to really make it a part of my work."

"Well, I am the mother of a child who wants to be a doctor and who goes to school in Cornwall. I want to be in a position to ensure we are providing the best opportunities for all the children in our schools to be able to actively choose their future and share Christian values.

"It's the whole child that matters"

"So much of my work has been in standards, but, alongside that, I don't lose sight of the fact that it's the whole child that matters."

Katie says that while she really values the opportunity to live and work in the diocese, she is not blind to the challenges that exist in Cornwall. "It's about using our core Christian values and the vision for education to help our young people navigate a rapidly changing and often confusing world by giving them the skills to do that."

OVER 200 ATTEND SERVICE FOR ARCHDEACON CLIVE

Over 200 people attended a service of thanksgiving for the life and ministry of The Venerable Canon Clive Cohen who was Archdeacon in this diocese between 2000 and 2011.

Held at St Michael's Church in Teignmouth where Clive and his wife June had moved following his retirement from the diocese in 2011, the service included a tribute from the Dean of Truro, the Very Revd Roger Bush. There were also two readings by his sons Alexander and Edward.

Clive is survived by his wife June, his children Katherine, Alexander, William and Edward and his seven grandchildren.

CHURCH'S COMMUNITY GARDEN UP FOR SOUTH WEST IN BLOOM

The community garden at All Saints Church in Mylor will be assessed for South West in Bloom in July.

The garden was developed, with help from a £1,820 Funds for Mission grant from the diocese, after church member Julie Munro read the diocese's 'Connecting me with climate Change' leaflet. Julie said: "It was as a result of reading the leaflet that I was inspired to ask the PCC if we could go ahead with a garden project on the land at the side and rear of the church. The land was never used."

It was decided to involve local organisations in making the plot into a community garden. As well as being

great for the environment it was also an excellent way for the church to engage with the local community and tick off a range of achievements as they work towards a Green Church Kernow (GCK) Award.

The garden now regularly features in the village magazine and has attracted support from other organisations including the local garden club, Women's Institute and Brownies.

Julie added: "After successful funding bids and a good deal of hard work, our garden is now growing. We are gardening organically, making compost, harvesting rainwater and have sown wild flower seeds and are growing companion plants to encourage wildlife."
