TAKING THE NEXT STEP: VOCATIONS DAY & FOND FAREWELL TO +CHRIS

Bishop Chris' leaving service will be an integral part of this year's Diocese of Truro Vocations Day in the cathedral on Saturday, September 14 - and it couldn't be more fitting.

Before his ordination, Bishop Chris spent many years as a Reader, and even longer as a disciple committed to bringing Christian values into the workplace and other areas of life – and the next step on his pilgrimage is to head up the Ministry Division for the Church of England. In this new role he will lead a team looking to encourage and increase the scale and diversity of those called to both lay and ordained ministries within the church.

Both Bishop Philip and Bishop Chris will be there for the day, and attendees will have an opportunity to hear from each of them.

The day will be punctuated by the opportunity to talk in small groups with facilitators. This will help those who come along to explore the call they might be experiencing and what the next steps might be for them.

Vocations Day open to all

Vocations Day is an opportunity for anybody to explore their calling – whatever that might be. It could be that someone feels called to the priesthood, but it could equally be that they are drawn to helping others in their community by becoming a local worship leader, local pastoral minister, a youth worker, a churchwarden, a teacher or school governor. The possibilities and opportunities for service are endless, and a calling can manifest itself in many ways. There will be people on hand to help you listen to the voice that is calling you, and to begin



After lunch, people will come together at 1.30pm for worship and the service of thanks for Bishop Chris's time in the diocese. Bishop Chris will preach – and it is hoped that others from across the diocese who might not have been able to make it for the full day will come along for this. After the service, there will be presentations to Bishop Chris and his wife, Ellie, who also served as a minister in the diocese, followed by tea and cake and the chance for everybody to socialise.

DIOCESAN SYNOD TO BE HELD IN SEPTEMBER

The next diocesan synod takes place at County Hall in Truro on Saturday, September 28 from 9am.

Members of the public are welcome to observe the meeting from the public gallery in the main council chamber.

Being discussed this month: shaping the diocesan budget for 2020 - 2022 and an update on MMF, an update on July's General Synod and a draft revised DAC constitution for approval.

OPENING DOORS, HEARTS AND KITCHENS TO THE HOMELESS

Homelessness, being disadvantaged, living on the margins. However you choose to describe the life circumstances of too many of our neighbours, it doesn't change the reality of what it is. Lonely, isolating, confusing, often scary and almost universally misunderstood.

Seen by many as problem people, two churches, St Michael's in Newquay and St Columb Minor, refuse to refer to those struggling to live as society expects as 'them'. "Neither are they problem people, they are simply people with problems," say Revd Jem Thorold and rural dean, Revd Chris McQuillan-Wright. People with names, back-stories and lives that deserve to be lived to the full.

When confronted with homelessness or similar issues, many people throw up their hands in despair and ask, often rhetorically, "But what can we do?" Revd Jem and Revd Chris would answer, "Roll up your sleeves, open your doors and work out the best way to make people feel welcome, valued and cared for."

Each is an associate priest to the other and between them, they have a powerful ministry for those closest to Jesus heart. "Come to me all who are weary and are carrying heavy burdens and I will give you rest," (Matthew 11:28).

Practicality, common sense and kindness lies behind the work at St Michael's. Under the title "Touch the hem of the cloak of Christ," a programme to offer food and a place to talk runs throughout the week. From Sunday through to Saturday there is something going on that involves food.

On Sunday and Monday there is Little Sparrows, when the church is open for tea, sandwiches, biscuits and cake if someone has made one. Run by volunteer Anthony Marriot, he doesn't sit and wait for the people to come, he goes out to where they are and personally invites them.

On Tuesday a drop in and share café (DISC) operates, run by another volunteer, Monique, with food provided by a restaurant chef from the town.

DISC is an inspiring model of how churches can reach out and help. It not only provides a warm welcome and a good lunch but also, on occasion, the free services of a vet, barber, debt counselling, access to help with addiction through Addaction and Newquay's only needle exchange.

On Thursday, they work with the Soul Food Kitchen at the Newquay Centre. It's a community-based project that provides a meal and somewhere safe to go. Friday is Foodbank day as well as DISC and on Saturday they run SNAK, another food-based welcome to whoever wants to come. Whatever day of the week, whatever your circumstances, there will be a warm welcome at St Michael's.

BRINGING BACK THE LIGHT

At the beginning of August, a group of pilgrims could be seen walking from Boscastle to its mother church, Minster Church, where there is a holy well.

Walking through the beautiful Valency Valley, they traced the footsteps of St Madryn who founded the church in its peaceful setting in the 6th Century. Madryn was a Welsh princess who became known as a healer, leading to a belief that the spring had healing powers.

Led by Bishop Chris, this was a pilgrimage with purpose. They were carrying the Light of Christ, represented by a candle in a lantern,

to dedicate the new windows at Minster. The pilgrims also stopped to collect water from the holy well for Bishop Chris to bless the windows.

Says Priest-in-Charge Revd Heather Aston, "It was a wonderful community event. We were delighted to welcome over 70 people and to make a special presentation to Arthur Bradley who, with his son-in-law Frank, was the craftsman who remade the windows bringing light back to the church."



'... BESIDE STILL WATERS' TO RE-DEDICATE A BENCH

The Bishop of Truro, the Rt Revd Philip Mounstephen has re-dedicated a bench in memory of Violet Knight, the mother of the city's current Town Crier, at Boscawen Park, Truro.

Lionel Knight, whose dulcet tones have been heard booming across Truro for the last five years in his civic role, originally placed a bench near the park in memory of his mum following her death aged 103 in 2013. But just before Christmas 2018, the bench was destroyed when it was hit by a car.

Having had the honour of showing the new Bishop around Truro on the morning of his installation as Bishop of Truro in January, Lionel made a special request to have the newly replaced bench blessed and re-dedicated by Bishop Philip.

Bishop Philip began by reading Psalm 23, The Lord is My Shepherd which very aptly includes the line 'He leads me beside still waters'.

In his blessing, Bishop Philip said: "Lord, today as we gather in memory of Vi, we give thanks for her life and her love of this beautiful city. We give thanks too for this place and we remember her enjoyment this beautiful view. We dedicate this place to her memory, and we pray for all those who come and sit beside the still waters that they may find rest for their souls. May your blessing rest upon them."

The short service finished with the Lord's Prayer.

Bioblitzes are carried out by groups of scientists, naturalists and volunteers, often including members of the public with the goal of encouraging more public interest in biodiversity and the natural world. The picture above shows

some of the people who took part at St Mary's and the ways the work was carried out and recorded.
